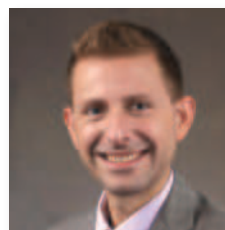

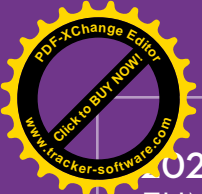

## TREATING THE WHOLE PATIENT

When Ali Frailey was diagnosed with breast cancer, she acted quickly upon receiving the news, tackling treatment and embarking on a road to recovery at Baptist Health Deaconess Madisonville.

“Being able to receive treatment close to home didn’t lessen the aggression of my disease, but it did lessen the feelings of anxiety that came along with it,” said Ali. “I was able to receive my treatment and then sleep in my own bed and be surrounded by family during the worst months of chemotherapy.”

“When I rang the bell after radiation, I couldn’t have my family there due to the pandemic,” recalled Ali. “Those employees lined up and clapped for me, and it just felt so wonderful knowing that I wasn’t alone and that all these wonderful, beautiful people were in my corner.”

At Baptist Health Deaconess Madisonville, we are leading the charge in the fight against cancer while taking great care to meet all the needs of our patients and their families. An interdisciplinary cancer team works to provide individualized treatment plans to meet the unique needs of each patient. We carefully consider all options and develop a personalized plan to treat the cancer, manage side effects, and help patients maintain energy during treatment.

“I was given many, many tools to be able to fight my battle, and here I am. The help that I was given during one of the most challenging times in my life can’t be summed up in words. It has given me back my life, my marriage, and time with my children. Because of the Baptist Health Merle M. Mahr Cancer Center and the staff working there, I was just able to watch my oldest son graduate high school. There is no price tag that you can put on being alive and being able to soak up every moment with your family.”

Time is everything during a heart attack, meaning it's essential to have emergency care close to home. That's why so many western Kentucky residents turn to Baptist Health Deaconess Madisonville for lifesaving cardiac care. The national standard for treatment during a cardiac emergency is 90 minutes – a standard Baptist Health Deaconess Madisonville is proud to beat. Our speed-to-treat program ensures fast and thorough cardiac care, as well as a personalized treatment plan tailored to individual patients.

Beyond fast heart attack response, Baptist Health Deaconess Madisonville offers a range of advanced cardiovascular care offerings.

Specialists in our cardiac catheterization lab can treat blood clots, implant pacemakers, place stents and more. The expertise of our surgeons provides access to open-heart surgery and numerous vascular surgery options.

We also offer non-invasive services like EKG, Holter monitors, echocardiogram and stress tests, along with radiology screenings, including nuclear studies and MRI.

Personalized cardiac rehabilitation programs help patients recover and maintain good health, while prevention programs promote a healthy diet and exercise – reflecting our commitment to promoting community health. This caliber of leading cardiac care is essential to delivering outcomes that our community deserves.

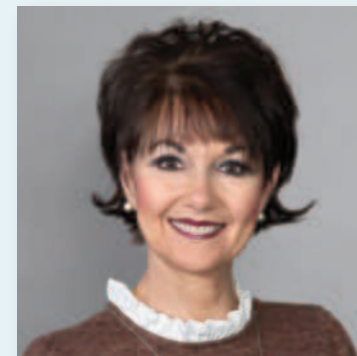

Baptist Health Deaconess Madisonville's experienced maternity care staff delivers around 718 babies each year. Lydia Long, director of mother and baby care, is proud to be a part of this dedicated team.

"Our mother and baby department has continued to evolve to reflect new technology, additional equipment and updated training for our staff to align with the most up-to-date healthcare practices," said Long. "Our main goal is to ensure that we have everything necessary to treat the physical components to labor and delivery, while relying on our staff to provide the emotional support for parents and infants that we believe sets us apart."

Anthem Blue Cross Blue Shield has named Baptist Health Deaconess Madisonville a Blue Distinction® Center for Maternity Care, meaning we are nationally recognized for expertise in patient safety and better health outcomes. Western Kentucky families have entrusted our team with their maternity needs for decades. We provide an entire range of mother and baby services, including prenatal care, labor and delivery services, newborn care and postpartum support.



“Through my role, I work closely with each member of our staff from nurses to physicians, and through those relationships I know that they view each patient with compassion and ensure they receive the treatment they would want their closest loved ones to have. Our goal is to ensure that we are not only treating the physical, but we are answering the emotional needs of everyone involved during such a life changing event in our patient's life.”

## LOVE HAS NO EXPIRATION DATE

Baptist Health Deaconess Madisonville Hospice, previously known as Green River Hospice, has served patients for more than 25 years with the primary objective to provide patients with the opportunity to remain in their own homes, or in homelike settings, while maintaining a strong emphasis on quality of life.

“Our goal as a unit is to make this process as simple as possible for the family, while ensuring that we are allowing their loved one to make a peaceful transition,” said Joyce Crump, director of hospice. “So many programs push terms like death and end of life, but we focus on making the most of the time that you have left, and ensuring that during every step in the process those involved are receiving the mental, physical and spiritual support they need.”

By providing a team approach, hospice care addresses the concerns of the family and offers palliative care to a patient in the final stage of a life-limiting illness, while their families prepare for the passing of their loved one. By education and example, our hope is to enhance the lives of those during this difficult phase of life by providing exceptional care and the ability to meet unique needs specific to each patient.

“We affirm life and neither hasten nor postpone death,” says Joyce. “We find that allowing each family to move naturally through this process is most beneficial. Our staff prides themselves on the relationships that they develop with their patients and patient families. They become an extension of our family and we are thankful to be able to be the support they need during some of the most difficult times any family experiences.”

# PRACTICING GRATITUDE FOR BETTER HEALTH & WELL-BEING

## SUPPORTING PATIENTS OF ALL SIZES

Baptist Health Deaconess Madisonville was awarded a \$10,000 WHAS Crusade for Children grant that was used to purchase a gait training device that will help children in the pediatric therapy program.

LiteGait® is a gait training device that simultaneously controls weight bearing, posture and balance over a treadmill or over ground. The unique harness allows unilateral or bilateral support, allowing progression of weight bearing so that gait training can begin earlier in the rehabilitation process. It suspends the patient and allows the clinician to manually assist the lower extremities and pelvis to achieve proper gait patterns.

“LiteGait has been on our capital equipment budget for at least the last five years,” said Marianne Ramsey, rehabilitation services director. “This new tool allows for us to further assist the children who require our services and provide them with an even higher level of care. We are able to provide standing support to the child while they work on upright activities, such as writing on a dry erase board, and it provides safeguarding for loss of balance when working on other gross motor skills.”

The Baptist Health Deaconess Madisonville Foundation submitted a grant proposal in conjunction with Julia Kays, Baptist Health Deaconess finance department, on behalf of pediatric therapy for funds from the WHAS Crusade for Children. A \$10,000 grant was awarded to use toward the equipment in the final quarter of 2020.

“We are continuously looking to improve upon the level of care we are able to provide our patients, but there is something even more rewarding when those enhancements are able to assist growing children to develop skills that they will utilize for the rest of their lives,” said Baptist Health Deaconess Madisonville President Rob Ramey.

## DELIVERING BEDSIDE SMILES AND SUPPORT

Baptist Health Deaconess Madisonville Foundation partnered with Ronald McDonald House Charities® of the Ohio Valley and local McDonald's franchises to enhance hospitality for hospital patients and their loved ones.

The collaboration centers on the addition of a Happy Wheels Cart to the Madisonville hospital, intent on delivering a smile to patients and their families. Each cart is equipped with beverages, snacks, and small toys and puzzle books. The hospitality a la carte program is free of charge.

"We are so excited to have brought this to Madisonville," said Austin Elliott, director of philanthropy. "We are always focused on finding ways to improve the patient experience. We are able to do this free of charge and our hope is that these small tokens can meet basic needs and help to provide a simple reminder that our hospital and our staff supports each patient and their family, especially during difficult times."

Local McDonald's owners Chris and Emily McEnaney provide cups and coffee free of charge.

"This was a natural fit for us," said McDonald's owner and operator Chris McEnaney. "The Ronald McDonald charity has always meant very much to me. My family and I have worked with them a lot in the past and now we are able to take something that will always have a big place in our hearts and bring it into our own community to benefit our friends, our family and our neighbors. We are very excited to be part of offering this to those undergoing challenging times or those welcoming new lives into the world."

This is the first Kentucky location for the Ronald McDonald House Charities® of the Ohio Valley Happy Wheels Cart. The charity has helped to establish this program in five Indiana hospitals and will now be entering the Bluegrass State.

"This all came about when we began looking for creative ways to partner with local businesses and existing charities to continue impacting our community," said Elliott. "We felt that this was a good fit for our hospital. Whether we provide a cup of coffee to a family member who is standing vigil beside a loved one's hospital bed, or a new mom who is working through exhaustion following labor and delivery – we hope to let every person who walks through our doors know that we care."

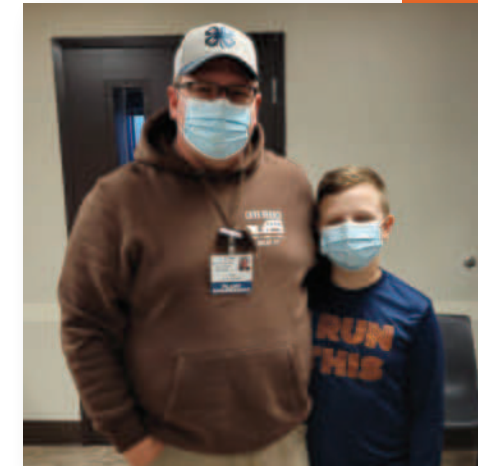
## EMERGENCY ASSISTANCE RELIEF

### ASSISTING EMPLOYEES THROUGH DISASTER

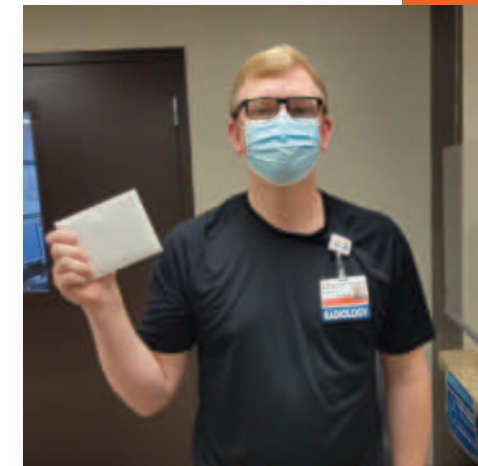

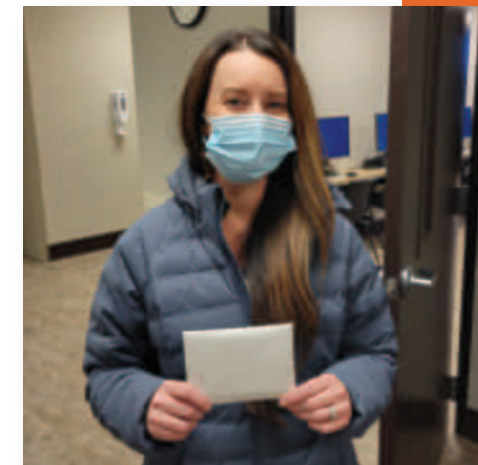

## COMPASSIONATE CARE LEADS TO REPEAT PATIENT

Skylar Hagerman always dreamed of having a family of her own, but she didn’t imagine that dream would come to fruition during a pandemic. “I have had dreams of becoming a mother since I was a little girl and you had to pry baby dolls out of my hands,” said the 31 year old who recently had her first daughter at Baptist Health Deaconess Madisonville.

“I never imagined that I would have my first baby during a pandemic, where I wore masks to every appointment and my mom couldn’t hold my other hand during delivery,” she said. “Going through this life-changing moment during a time of uncertainty caused my already high anxiety to skyrocket. What I didn’t account for was a physician who was always on call for my every question, who knew my story, and who treated me like a friend. I didn’t expect nurses who had only met me after my first appointment to talk to me like they’d known me for years. The staff at our hospital went above and beyond to make up for a situation they had no control over – they became an extension of my family.” While celebrating her daughter Caroline’s first Christmas, the couple found out they were expecting another child. With the world opening back up, Skylar and her husband, Grayson, are preparing for a new complication – two children under the age of 2.

“There was no doubt about where I was going to have my second child,” she said. “I could not have asked for a better experience with Caroline, and there is no one that we would trust more to bring Genevieve into this world than the staff who so expertly handled us just over a year ago. The staff at Baptist Health Deaconess Madisonville have a personal touch that I have never experienced with any other hospital or medical staff, and you can’t put a price tag on that.”

Emily and her son had such a wonderful experience at Baptist Health Deaconess Madisonville that she “cannot stop recommending it to friends in the area.” It’s also reinforced her commitment to show gratitude whenever possible.

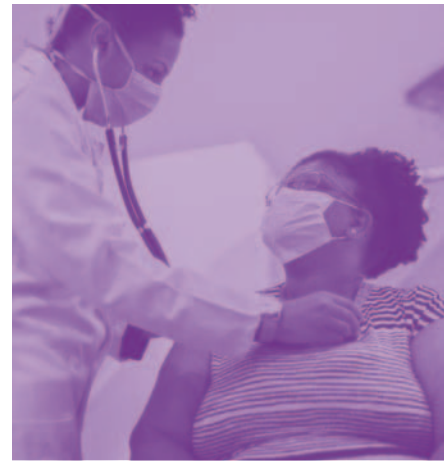
